Two entrants launch the 2022 Miss SNPJ Pageant



Cleveland Federation President Bro. Joe Valencic selected for induction into the Cleveland International Hall of Fame

CLEVELAND — On June 7, Bro. Joe Valencic, a member of SNPJ Lodge 5 who serves as president of the Cleveland Federation of SNPJ Lodges and is a well-known figure in the Slovenian-American community, will be inducted into the Cleveland International Hall of Fame at Windows on the River in Cleveland's Flats.

The Cleveland International Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have made valuable and lasting multicultural contributions to Cleveland and the region, and who inspire new generations of leaders.

Cleveland Bishop Edward Malesic will give the invocation and share his Slovenian-American heritage story. NBC-TV anchor Russ Mitchell will be the event emcee. Nine other individuals from Cleveland-area communities will also be inducted.

Joe joins six other Slovenian-American leaders whose efforts to build bridges with the city have been acknowledged by the Cleveland Inter-

national Hall of Fame: Hon. George V. Voinovich, Tony Petkovsek, Dick Russ, Vladimir Rus, August Pust, and Bishop A. Edward Pevec.

Joe is a creative and inspiring leader within the Slovenian-American scene – not only in the Cleveland area, but in communities across the United States. He is a founder and past president of the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame and directs the Museum and Archives. Since 1982 he has also been serving as president of the Cleveland Federation of SNPJ Lodges which operates the SNPJ Farm in Kirtland, Ohio.

Each year, Joe organizes several Slovenian cultural events in the Cleveland area. His Saturday radio broadcast features music and news from Slovenia on WINT 1330 AM, 101.5 FM, and 247polkaheaven.com in both English and Slovenian.

Joe documents the Slovenian-American experience in films, and through lectures and exhibitions. He has served as guest curator for exhibitions in the United States, Italy

and Slovenia; and has written or cowritten documentaries for TV Slovenia, most notably "Polka! The Movie," about Slovenian music and sausages in America, and "100% Slovenian," the stories of Slovenian-American women, in addition to "Many Voices, One Heart," which profiles the Slovenian St. Mary's Parish in Cleveland's Collinwood neighborhood. He also writes English subtitles for films from Slovenia.

Joe is a member of the international advisory board of Slovenia's Office for Slovenes Abroad, representing Slovenian communities in the United States. He has been invited to speak to Slovenian-American organizations in 13 states, as well as in Slovenia and Slovenian centers in Italy, Austria and Hungary. Joe sees the commonalities and

synergies between Slovenians here and in the homeland, and enables both groups to develop exchanges and celebrate their cultural identity.

Be proactive with your life insurance portfolio

Medal of Merit for two U.S. Slovenians

WASHINGTON, D.C. (STA) — Slovenia honored American-Slovenians Mark Ryavec and Stephen Antalics with the Medal of Merit for their efforts in the U.S. recognition of independent Slovenia during the early 1990s. Slovenian Ambassador to the United States Tone Kajzer presented the decorations on behalf of President Borut Pahor at the Slovenian Embassy on April 25.

Mark Ryavec, a member of SNPJ Lodge 786, in Orange County, Calif., who served as Slovenia's Honorary Consul in Los Angeles from 1996-2002, received the medal for his contribution to the country's recognition by the U.S. He has also contributed to the promotion of Slovenian culture and art in the U.S. For example, he organized a high-profile exhibition of Slovenian masterpieces at the Los Angeles Craft & Folk Art Museum in 2000.

Ryavec, whose grandfather left Slovenian lands near Trieste for the United States in 1908, is also credited with the city of Los Angeles recognizing Slovenia and Croatia in July 1991, which amounts to the first official documentation of Slovenia's recognition in the United States.

Stephen Antalics was honored for his efforts to preserve the Slovenian identity. Antalics, who only recently received Slovenian citizenship at the age of 93, is the founder of the Bethlehem, Pa., and Murska Sobota Twin Cities Association.

Antalics was born in Bethlehem to Slovenian parents who left a village near Murska Sobota, in Slovenia's Prekmurje region, prior to the First World War. Since Prekmurje was under Hungarian rule until the end of WWI, Hungarian churches in the U.S. managed to persuade many emigrants that they were the descendants of a Windish people. Many Slovenians accepted this narrative until Antalics thoroughly researched the matter at Lehigh University to prove they were Slovenians.

Book traces Slovenia's independence year

LJUBLJANA (STA) — Publisher Družina and the Government Communication Office (UKOM) launched a monograph chronicling the events from Dec. 23, 1990, when Slovenians opted for independence in a referendum, and from Jan. 15, 1992, when Slovenia was recognized as an independent country by the European Community, the forerunner of the EU. At present, only a Slovenian language book is available.

The book, titled "Triumphant Year Independence Story of Our State Slovenia," includes photos and articles from 21 authors, historians, journalists, commentators, political analysts and other experts.

The publication is a summary of contributions made during a project running from December 2020 and January 2022 in which the authors were seeking answers to questions about Slovenia's independence 30 years ago, such as who were the main players taking Slovenia onto the path of independence, and how Slovenians were coping with the challenges at the time.

For sources, the authors relied on domestic and foreign newspapers published at the time that reported on events in Slovenia, as well as literature discussing events related to the independence process. All contributions to the book include a QR code that allows the reader to view the contribution in its original form on the gov.si/slovenija30 website.

Tour of Slovenia attracting top cyclists

LJUBLJANA (STA) — The Tour of Slovenia, the largest road cycling event in the country, will run its 28th race in mid-June, this time with live spectators. Covering almost 800 kilometers (roughly 500 miles), the five-stage race will again attract the greatest names in the sport, including the world's top-ranked cyclist, Slovenian Tadej Pogačar.

The organizers have announced a technically demanding race which is, in a way, becoming a national cycling holiday given that Slovenia currently has three cyclists among the world's top five. "You can see that Slovenians have adopted this race as their own, so a strong, positive, national charge is expected," Tour of Slovenia Director Bogdan Fink told the press.

The race around Slovenia is increas-



ingly being promoted as a warm-up for the Tour de France, which is evident from the names of competitors who have registered. Four teams from the elite class are expected among the 22 teams that will take part.

Fink promised a route that offers an "exceptionally watchable race," adding that "the stages are set for up to four hours of racing, speeds will be high, and everybody will get their opportunity along the route."

The five-day race will start June 15 in Nova Gorica, with the first stage ending in Postojna. The second stage will take the competitors from Ptuj to Rogaška Slatina, and the third stage from Žalec to Celje, featuring a key climb. On the fourth day, June 18, the caravan will run from Laško to the Velika Planina plateau, passing Pogačar's native village of Klanec; the final stage will take the cyclists from Vrhnika to Novo Mesto.

While the race will be an opportunity to prove who is the best rider ahead of the Tour de France, the organizers also expect that Slovenia will be promoted as an exceptional host of international sporting events, as well as a green tourist destination.

In addition to public broadcaster RTV Slovenija, the race will again be broadcast live by the Eurosport international sports network for a total of 10 hours. The live broadcast will be available in 130 countries.

Ljubljana a Tree City for the third straight year

LJUBLJANA (STA) — With 1,080 new trees having been planted in Ljubljana in 2021, and 230 more planted this spring, the Slovenian capital had no problems remaining on the list of Tree Cities of the World compiled by the Arbor Day Foundation and the UN Food and Agriculture Organization.

For the third year in a row Ljubljana has made the list, which includes 137 cities for 2021. Municipal representatives responded by pointing to the importance of trees for the city, society and individuals. "Ljubljana is part of an important global network that is paving the way when it comes to care for urban forests and trees in cities," the representatives wrote.

Investment in trees in the Slovenian capital increased by 25 percent in 2021 compared to the year prior.

A recent report by the European Environment Agency (EEA) ranks Ljubljana among the European capitals with the highest ratings in terms of urban tree cover and total green infrastructure. In terms of the percentage of urban tree cover and total green infrastructure, Ljubljana ranked third among the EEA member capital cities. The only European capital cities with more urban tree cover are Oslo, Norway, and Bern, Switzerland.

Researchers can now dig deeper into diabetes

 $MARIBOR\,(STA) - \hbox{In mid-April, the}$ University of Maribor acquired a confocal laser scanning microscope that will enable researches to study intercellular changes in a effort to seek out new drug targets to treat or cure diabetes.

The unit, a Stellaris 8 Falcon DIVE, was acquired as part of the project to upgrade Slovenia's national research infrastructure. Andraž Stožer, a member of the university's Faculty of Medicine, said that this is "probably the most advanced confocal laser scanning microscope in the world."

The microscope will be available to a wide range of researchers, allowing them to study intracellular and intercellular processes in the pancreas, along with the mechanisms that lead to overactivity of the bladder.

Confocal microscopy is useful in recording the dynamics of intracellular changes in calcium concentration, which serve as a marker of cell function. It also allows for recording at the sub-cellular level and on a large number of cells within the organ that is being studied.

Stožer said it is key that the cells stay alive for a long time, and their responses are very similar to those of the entire organism, which gives researchers a key advantage and an opportunity to look for new drug targets based on insights into what goes wrong in cells.

Orange wines take center stage in Izola

IZOLA (STA) — The Orange Wine Festival physically returned to Manzioli Square in Izola in late April, featuring 62 winemakers from Slovenia, Italy, Croatia, Austria, Hungary, Greece and Georgia. The winemakers showcased roughly 200 wines.

Orange wines are sustainably produced white macerated wines involving minimal intervention by the winemaker, a process the festival organizers say is becoming an increasingly established style of production.

Both the winemakers and the organizers had been waiting – impatiently – for the annual festival to return in its standard, pre-Covid-19 format. Matej Zaro, one of the event hosts, noted that a similar iteration of the festival was held at the beginning of April in Verona, Italy, as part of the Vinitaly Festival, which showed that the fairs and exhibitions industry is fully back to business after the pandemic.

Speaking to the press, Zaro noted that the Orange Wine Festival was created to showcase winemakers who share the same mindset of sustainable, organic or biodynamic work in the vineyards. Orange wines account for a mere one to two percent of total wine production, which makes them "a niche segment, but one that has made its way into haute cuisine," according to Zaro.

These exclusive wines are increasingly sought after, and the region between the Alps and the Adriatic is recognized around the globe for its orange wines.

On the eve of the Orange Wine Festival, a documentary on the ancient wine tradition and its revival premiered at the Koper theatre. "Call It Amber" was filmed in several locations, including Georgia, Slovenia and Italy.

Maribor launches its own bike sharing system

MARIBOR (STA) — In April the city of Maribor introduced a bicycle sharing system, Mbajk, which at present comprises 21 docking stations and 210 bicycles spread across the broader area of the city center. The system was officially launched May 3, following the May Day holidays.

The bikes are intended for single-ride hire, not for multi-hour or full-day hire. "This is a practical and environmentallyfriendly addition to the public transportation system in the city," according to the Maribor municipality.

Users can rent a bike at any of the 21 stations, and return it to any of the stations as well. The bikes can be rented via a terminal at the station, or by using the Mbajk mobile app. Renters can also check the availability of free bikes and locks available at each station.

The annual registration fee costs EUR 3 (approx. \$3.15). The first hour of each rental is free for an unlimited number of rentals. The system will be operational 24 hours a day, every day of the year. Users can register for the system at www.mbajk.si.

According to Maribor Mayor Saša Arsenovič, the city plans to expand the sharing network in the future.

The village of Stanjel welcomes new museum

ŠTANJEL (STA) — A new museum opened in the medieval village of Štanjel in mid-April. The museum's first exhibition, "Nature and Man in the Karst Region," offers an interactive experience of the Karst area and is mainly targeted toward families and schoolchildren.

Housed in the renovated Stanjel Castle, the museum will promote the region's cultural heritage and biotic diversity, and will advocate nature conservation.

Štanjel Castle had been in need of renovation for years. In 2010, the municipality failed to receive funding from the Culture Ministry to complete the renovation. "But the situation improved once the castle acquired the relevant status by becoming part of a ministrysponsored project aimed at promoting and preserving biodiversity," Komen Mayor Erik Modic explained.

The EUR 900,000 (\$978,800) project marks the single largest investment in Štanjel Castle to date. Comprising some 400 square meters (43,000 square feet) of exhibit space, the museum hopes to boost local tourism.







Thirty years of the U.S., Slovenia and SNPJ

CLEVELAND — Thirty years ago, on April 7, 1992, Slovenian-Americans across the country had reason to celebrate: The White House had finally recognized Slovenia as an independent nation. After nine months of letters, petitions, postcards and phone calls to President George H. W. Bush, the unified, grassroots efforts of Slovenians in the United States had achieved the validation crucial to the survival of the fledgling democracy. The Slovene National Benefit Society played a role in that process.

On that day of recognition, the United Americans for Slovenia (UAS), the group that brought together Slovenian-American organizations, called a press conference and raised the flags of the United States and Slovenia in front of their Cleveland headquarters, the offices of American Mutual Life Association (AMLA). Three days after U.S. recognition, the UAS hosted a gala event in Cleveland's Slovenian National Home ballroom. Slovenia was finally accepted as a sovereign nation, equal to all others on the world stage.

Today's headlines remind us of what was at stake in Slovenia. In June 1991 we watched in horror as Slovenia's declaration of independence from Yugoslavia was met with violence. Tanks rolled into Ljubljana, the picturesque capital. Communications towers and Brnik airport were bombed. Lives were lost. Slovenians resisted. Slovenian-Americans quickly rallied to assist the homeland.

On June 30, representatives from Slovenian-American organizations met at the Slovenian National Home to strategize. Edmund J. Turk, past president of the

Cleveland City Council and a former district judge, was chosen to chair a new endeavor, United Americans for Slovenia. Representatives of leading Slovenian-American fraternal societies, parishes, lodges and cultural groups worked through the UAS to appeal to the White House and government leaders to recognize Slovenia as an independent democracy. SNPJ Lodge 5 member Joe Valencic directed the communications and public relations. Regional Vice President Betty Rotar represented the SNPJ.

For the next nine months, volunteers from these groups implemented communications strategies and created events to call attention to Slovenia's independence and the importance of U.S. recognition. Community media, such as the SNPJ PROSVETA, American Home, fraternal newspapers and radio shows, reported on UAS activities and events in Slovenia. The UAS grew to include 659 Slovenian-American organizations and institutions – the greatest unified effort to help Slovenia since World War II. Many SNPJ volunteers were involved.

Government leaders, including Ohio Senator John Glenn and Ohio Congressman Dennis Eckart, a member of SNPJ Lodge 5, met with UAS representatives to discuss U.S. recognition, as did visiting officials from the new government of Slovenia, including Dimitrij Rupel, Zoran Thaler and Ernest Petrič.

"We sent 50,000 postcards to President Bush, asking him to recognize Slovenia, as well as petitions with thousands of signatures," recalls Edmund Turk. "The United Americans for Slovenia proved that when Slovenian-Americans pull together, they can move mountains."

Two of the most effective UAS strategies were White House phone-in marathons on Oct. 7, 1991, and Feb. 12, 1992, hosted by the late Tony Petkovsek (604) through his Slovenian-American radio show. The UAS also placed an open letter to President Bush in The Washington Post. Donations and fund-raisers made these efforts possible.

UAS representatives met frequently for planning, updates, and news from Slovenia and Washington, D.C., as well as to stuff envelopes for mailings. By April 1992 it was clear that the hard work was paying off and recognition was near. On the morning of April 7, the board received word that the United States had officially accepted Slovenia's nationhood.

It was sunny that afternoon when we gathered in front of the AMLA building to hoist the flags. We were exhilarated as we posed for photos to commemorate the historic occasion. As soon as that moment passed we got busy again; we had only a couple of days to bring the Slovenian community and its friends together for a grand tribute to the new Slovenia.

On April 10, the UAS hosted a celebration in Cleveland's Slovenian National Home ballroom. The United Slovenian Society marching band performed under the baton of Norman Novak. The crowd of 800 stood as a hundred members from the area's Slovenian choruses sang the anthems, "The Star-Spangled Banner" and "Zdravljica," led by Cecilia Dolgan (576). Fr. Joseph Boznar, pastor of St. Vitus Church, gave a blessing. Edmund Turk addressed the crowd, as did Dr. Karl Bonutti (5), soon to become one of Slovenia's first honorary consuls. The featured speaker was Ohio Governor George

Voinovich (604), who was visibly moved by the occasion. Local television and news reports captured the excitement of the evening.

Within weeks, Slovenia was welcomed into the United Nations. By August, the U.S. opened a new embassy in Ljubljana, and the Embassy of the Republic of Slovenia was dedicated in Washington, D.C.

The United States has become Slovenia's largest non-European trading partner. Slovenian and U.S. heads of state have exchanged visits. Bilateral cooperation includes political, economic, commercial, defense and security, educational, and exchange activities as the U.S. seeks to help Slovenia maintain its position as a positive and stabilizing influence in that part of Europe.

The United Americans for Slovenia redirected its attention with a new campaign to influence U.S. acceptance of Slovenia as a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. A new communications strategy was formulated with mailings, articles and a radio marathon. Members of the UAS, including SNPJ National President Joe Evanish, were invited to the White House for a discussion – a first for the Slovenian-American community. The United States supported Slovenia's accession to NATO in March 2004. Slovenia joined the European Union that May, and the Eurozone in 2007. Slovenia completed its second six-month presidency of the EU in December 2021.

Slovenia has proved itself to be one of the world's most successful new nations. With Slovenia secure in its independence and U.S. and international recognition, United Americans for Slovenia completed their mission

United Americans for Slovenia: A timeline of the nine months from independence to U.S. recognition

1991

June 25

Slovenia declares independence from Yugoslavia, six months after Slovenians vote for secession in a democratically-held plebiscite vote.

June 26

The Yugoslav Army attacks Slovenia, closing border posts and halting communications with the outside world. Slovenian-Americans and their organizations first express concern to U.S. President George H. W. Bush and officials, and then begin war relief efforts.

Attorney Charles Ipavec and Cleveland Yugoslav Consul General Matjaž Jančar call an emergency meeting of community leaders at Cleveland's Slovenian National Home. Representatives of the country's leading Slovenian-American fraternal societies, parishes, cultural groups and action committees are chosen to serve on a special board - led by attorney, former judge and head of Cleveland City Council Edmund Turk - to call United States' attention to the situation in the homeland.

July 1

The United Americans for Slovenia (UAS) is established to unite America's Slovenian organizations to seek U.S. recognition of Slovenia's declaration of independence and establishment of full diplomatic relations. Stanley Ziherl, president of the American Mutual Life Association (AMLA), offers his offices for meetings. A letter is drafted to President Bush and members of Congress to recognize Slovenia. UAS representatives meet weekly.

July 4

UAS volunteers send letters and information packages to President Bush, senators and congress members, along with special editions of the American Home newspaper prepared by publisher James Debevec and editor Rudolph Susel. Mailings to Slovenian-American organizations, clubs and parishes distribute thousands of pre-printed postcards and petitions asking President Bush to accept Slovenia. Joseph Valencic directs all communications and publicity. John Pestotnik coordinates mailings and special projects.

July 5

Matjaž Jančar is the first Yugoslav diplomat to declare allegiance to Slovenia and becomes the first representative to the United States from the new nation. Without accreditation, he must soon return to Slovenia.

Ohio Congressman Dennis Eckart announces support for Slovenia at a UAS session.

August

The UAS continues mailings to U.S. officials and monitors recognition efforts in Washington and Ljubljana. Similar overseas organizations are in contact with the UAS. American and Slovenian community leaders meet

with the UAS. The American Home (Ameriška domovina) and Slovenian-American fraternal publications promote UAS recognition efforts nationally to members and subscribers.

August 3

A radio marathon, hosted by Tony Petkovsek and the American Slovene Radio Club from his studio at the Kollander Travel offices, generates 600 donations to fund UAS actions. The four-hour broadcast on Ohio station WELW receives calls from around the country, London and Ljubljana.

August 5

Ohio Senator John Glenn announces support for recognition of Slovenia at a UAS press conference. Glenn and Eckart send a joint statement to President Bush to recognize Slovenia.

The last Yugoslav Army troops withdraw from Slovenia. Slovenia opens an office in Washington, D.C., headed by Dr.

Ernest Petrič. September 13

Each day through Oct. 8, the UAS sends petitions with 500 names to the White House asking President Bush's acceptance of Slovenia as a democratic nation.

October 7

Thousands call the White House in a UAS-sponsored phone-in. The UAS prints postcards asking President Bush for U.S. recognition. The President eventually receives 50,000 postcards from Americans and UAS-member societies from coast to coast.

November

UAS members monitor resolutions being drafted in Congress for U.S. recognition of Slovenia.

November 2

Dr. Ernest Petrič and Janez Dular of the Slovenian Foreign Ministry meet with the UAS. Both express Slovenia's gratitude for the recognition efforts by Americans. Slovenian newspapers, television and radio report on UAS activities and efforts.

December

Editors of Slovenian-American fraternal society newspapers follow the lead by the UAS and step-up White House contact efforts by their members.

December 6

President Bush imposes economic sanctions against Slovenia, Yugoslavia and former republics, canceling aid and trade benefits.

December 17

The UAS publishes an advertisement on the Federal Page of The Washington Post newspaper appealing to President Bush and Congress to recognize Slovenia. Dr. Petrič and UAS Chairman Edmund Turk receive many calls and letters of support.

The European Community announces plans to recognize Slovenia.

1992

January

The UAS contacts members of Congress to support Kansas Senator Robert Dole's resolution for recognition of Slovenia.

January 15

The European Community recognizes Slovenia. Canada, Australia, Japan and many other countries soon follow.

February 12 A second national White House phone-in is organized by the UAS. Busy phone lines extend the phone-in two more

The UAS tracks rumors of impending U.S. recognition.

April 7

President Bush recognizes Slovenia as an independent, democratic nation and lifts sanctions. Slovenia now can be considered for membership in the United States and World Bank. The UAS holds a press conference with Zoran Thaler, visiting from the Slovenian Foreign Ministry. UAS representatives raise the flags of the United States and Slovenia in front of the AMLA building.

April 10

The UAS hosts a celebration at Cleveland's Slovenian National Home with guest speakers, including Ohio Governor George Voinovich. More than 100 singers from 10 local Slovenian choruses sing the United States anthem and debut "Zdravljica," the national anthem of Slovenia, for the 800-plus audience.

April 21

The UAS recognizes Dole, Eckart and Glenn with plaques at a Washington reception in honor of Slovenia.

President Bush grants full diplomatic relations between the United States and Slovenia.

August 21

The Republic of Slovenia opens an embassy in Washington, D.C.

August 25

The United States opens an embassy in Ljubljana.

September 7

The UAS delivers an American-made flag of Slovenia to President Bush in gratitude for his full acceptance of Slovenia as an independent, democratic nation.

Plenty of dough, family and friends combine for a Good Friday tradition

Joanne puts together *žli*krofe as she was taught by our mother, Ann Glovach, many years ago. The žlikrofe are little pierogi-style dumplings, but are filled with cubes of bread which have been covered with egg, fried, then put into the dough and boiled. When done, buttered and browned buttered bread cubes are poured over the top.

Evelyn prepares štruklji, also made with dough that is rolled out to a large square, very thin, and covered with a cottage cheese mixed with egg, sugar and buttered bread crumbs; then rolled into a dampened white cloth, tied

with string and placed into a large pot of boiling water and cooked for 45 minutes. When done, the štruklji is rolled onto a serving plate and also covered with browned buttered bread crumbs.

Jim Vasilko, Joanne's son, brought haluski to the dinner; and Joanne's daughter, Judy Edsall, prepared the pierogies. Good friends Marian and Charlie Bartosh provided Slovenian-style coleslaw for all to enjoy.

Those in attendance at this traditional dinner were 99 percent SNPJ members, including Joanne's grandchildren, great-grandchildren, in-laws, and Tom and Cheryl Gross.

Due to the Covid situation, it was decided to cut down on the number of invited guests, and for the past two years Joanne and Evelyn served only 10 family members and friends - but everyone has a good time!
