The current SNPJ National Athletic Board includes District 1 Director Jason Cadez, District 2 Director Den Brand, District 3 Director David Sankovich, District 4 Director Rick Gorjup, District 5 Director Ken Anderson, and

District 6 Director Mary Donovan.

Candidates to the National Athletic Board must be a member of SNPJ in good standing for at least two years. He or she must also have a practical knowledge of the Society's major athletic activities.

Athletic directors play an important role in our Society, are aware of athletic needs in their district, and encourage participation from youth and adults in all areas, from local to national competition. They oversee all regional and national tournaments, and they report their activities at the two Athletic Board meetings.

SNPJ has six athletic districts, which are as follows:

DISTRICT 1: Cambria, Somerset, Luzerne, Fayette, Washington, Westmoreland, and Elk counties in Pennsylvania; and the state of Florida

DISTRICT 2: Allegheny and Beaver counties in Pennsylvania

DISTRICT 3: The Borough of SNPJ and Mercer County in Pennsylvania; and Mahoning, Trumbull, Columbiana, Belmont and Stark counties in Ohio

DISTRICT 4: Cuyahoga, Ashtabula, Lake, Portage and Summit counties in Ohio **DISTRICT 5:** The state of Michigan

"My original SNPJ insurance policy was purchased at my birth in 1927 by my grandfather, Frank Popelar, who was an active member of SNPJ. In 1965 I continued with the SNPJ paid-up policy that I have been notified as outlived. In celebration of my 70 years of fraternal membership, I was awarded the custom-embroidered blanket that I use and treasure every day. Thank you.

"I was born at home on a farm near Livingston, Ill., on Nov. 15, 1927. I grew up on this farm, and later on a farm in Litchfield, Ill. My father farmed with horses until he began using a tractor in the 1930s. In those days I milked cows by hand every day before and after school. There were no school buses, and I walked through the pasture as it was shorter that way on my way to grade school. Going to Litchfield High School, I rode in a milk truck with the driver being another older student. Milk was contained in eight- or 10-gallon cans that needed to be unloaded at Litchfield Creamery, processors of milk, butter and ice cream, and also a producer of Milnot.

"I graduated from Litchfield High School in 1944 at the age of 16. Our country was at war in those days, and I was interviewed at graduation by government officials for a position as secretary in an office of the U.S. Treasury Department in Chicago. I had never before ridden on a train or been to any large city. My fears were somewhat tempered with several classmates who were also going. My office was located on the seventh floor of the Merchandise Mart, where we typed on electric typewriters (another first) and could look out over the Chicago River.

"Following over two years in Chicago, I returned to Litchfield to work for Litchfield Community Savings and Loan as a loan officer and a board member secretary. Later I sold real estate until my retirement in 2010. Other events in my life include vacation trips to Alaska, the British Isles, Hawaii, and much of the United States. As a medical volunteer I made several trips to Honduras.

"I married in 1948 and have been blessed with three beautiful children. Howard, the oldest, is a retired CPA; Kenneth, also retired, was president of Schutt Mfg., a manufacturer of football helmets. Marilyn, the youngest, has a successful career as an online certified quilting instructor. I also have six grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren, with one great-grandchild deceased.

"Thank you, SNPJ, for all that you do."

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Defense Ministry signs agreement with Maribor U

MARIBOR (STA) — The Slovenian Defense Ministry and Maribor University signed a cooperation agreement in early February, some six months after similar accords were signed with the universities in Ljubljana and Koper. The agreements cover education, training, research and development.

The goal is to strengthen cooperation that died down somewhat after 2016, when previous agreements with the three universities expired. Last year, similar agreements were also signed with the Maribor-based Alma Mater Europaea University, a private school, and the Faculty of Organization Studies in Novo Mesto.

The February agreement was signed by Maribor University Rector Zdravko Kačič and Defense Minister Marjan Sarec; the latter expressing satisfaction with the signing, saying Maribor and the entire northeast of the country had played a vital role in Slovenia's history in general, as well as the nation's military history.

"Maribor is important to us," Minister Sarec was quoted as saying in a press release. "The agreement signed today indicates a path forward – of the Slovenian military becoming integrated in society and the education system."

Kačič said the university had a very positive view of this cooperation. "We are aware that the Slovenian military is the pillar that allows us to do what we do."

The cooperation will take place on several levels: graduate and postgraduate programs related to military sciences, defense studies and the system of protection against natural and other disasters, and a military module offered as part of other accredited study programs.

The Defense Ministry will be investing EUR 23 million (\$24.7 million) in research and development, which accounts for more than two percent of Slovenia's current defense budget.

Brnik Airport marking a 60th anniversary in 2024

BRNIK (STA) — This year marks the 60th anniversary of passenger traffic at Brnik Airport. As noted in a January press release, 47.7 million passengers have traveled through Slovenia's main airport [since its opening]. In the coming months, a number of events at the airport will mark the anniversary.

In 1964, when passenger traffic at Brnik was launched, 78,000 people traveled through the airport that year, a figure that barely compares to the 1.27 million passengers recorded last year.

The first routes established were to Belgrade, Dubrovnik, London and Algiers, operated by the Yugoslav carriers JAT and Adria-Aviopromet. This summer, passengers will be able to fly to 26 destinations on 22 carriers, according to airport operator Fraport Slovenija.

To mark the anniversary, videos and exhibitions at the airport over the next few months will present the development of the airport over the past six decades. In addition, a number of events are scheduled to mark the occasion.

Fraport Slovenija is seeing a marked increase in passenger numbers after a trying period: first, the bankruptcy of Adria Airways, followed by the Covid-19 pandemic. Preliminary forecasts by carriers for this summer indicate a 10 percent increase in flight frequencies on regular routes.

Fraport has invested EUR 67 million (\$73.2 million) since it took over the airport 10 years ago and intends to invest almost as much by 2030. The largest investment to date has been the new passenger terminal. The company's next investment cycle will focus on a modernization and expansion of the airport's runways, ramps and other hard surfaces, along with a green transition.

Ski resorts struggle at the start of the season

LJUBLJANA (STA) — With the start of the new year, Slovenia's winter resorts and ski lift operators had been struggling mightily this winter in the face of unseasonably high temperatures and an almost complete absence of natural snow. The number of skiers recorded at the end of 2023 was less than half the 2021 figure, but there was still hope following the low temperatures recorded in mid-January.



Boštjan Paradiž, the head of the Association of Ski Lift Operators, told the press that the weather in December kept many ski resorts closed. Many of the small resorts remained idle, while most of the largest resorts were operating at limited capacity. The first serious snow of the season in Slovenia fell Jan. 19-20.

"The cooler spell seen [in mid-January] at least allows for artificial snowmaking," Paradiž added, while comparing the roughly 150,000 skiers recorded at the end of December 2023 to 180,000 during the same period in 2022, and 330,000 in 2021.

"It's too early to say whether this winter season is already lost, but the fact is that the first part did not give much reason for optimism. The thing is, Christmas and the New Year holidays are among the highlights for many resorts."

As Paradiž sees it, Slovenian ski resorts will have to secure sufficient resources to produce artificial snow and [maintain] large enough reservoirs in the future if skiing is here to stay. However, Slovenia's winter resorts aren't located at very high altitudes – the sole exception being Kanin, in the northwest on the border with Italy – and a push has come from the government for the resorts to transition to year-round tourism.

Most of the major Slovenian ski resorts have received major subsidies from the government, and together they invested almost EUR 80 million (\$86.7 million) in infrastructure last year. The resorts did so mainly with a view to further expand operations beyond winter, which the government made a condition for the EUR 55 million (\$59.6 million) in grants provided.

Paradiž argued that this support and development are crucial; however, he feels the transition will require time. He pointed out that Slovenia's ski resorts are still driven by winter tourism, which accounts for roughly 65 percent of total revenue for many of them.

Waste in Koroška region now being sorted by robot

SLOVENJ GRADEC (STA) — The Kocerod waste treatment company in the northern Koroška region purchased a waste sorting robot in 2023. Initial results are promising, and the company is already planning to purchase a second robot in 2024.

"Waste sorting is physically demanding work," said Kocerod director Ivan Plevnik, adding that there was "no future in doing the work as it had been done in the past decades."

The company purchased the robot from AMP Robotics, an American company, and installed it last December. The robot is currently undergoing a trial run to determine its efficiency. "Initial results show that working with this machine... is extremely efficient and that this is the solution for sorting in the future," Plevnik said.

The robot scans all waste and can provide information on it. It can sort up to three waste parcels at a time by

imitating the movement of human hands. Kocerod is already planning to purchase another robot to completely automate its waste sorting process. The company employs 110 workers, 11 of whom work in sorting. Estimates show that the robot can replace two to three workers per shift. To account for that, the workers will be transferred to other work sites, and the company will not replace some retiring workers with new hires.

The waste sorting plant, which operates at a maximum capacity of 5,500 tons per year, processes around 4,200 tons of waste every year. Following the August floods, the plant received some 2,750 tons of additional waste in 2023.

Newly updated riding hall opens at Lipica

LIPICA (STA) — A renovated riding hall was inaugurated at the Lipica Stud Farm in late January. In addition to a new roof, a completely new training arena, electrical and other updates, the hall is now more comfortable for spectators.

The hall now features an exhibition room where visitors can admire the carriages used at Lipica, the world's oldest, continuously operating stud farm.

Just over a year after the tradition of Lipizzan breeding was added to the UNESCO representative list of intangible cultural heritage of humanity, an exhibition about this classic riding school has been renewed as part of the riding hall renovation.

During the introduction of the newly remodeled facility, for the first time the training demonstration was accompanied by videos of training and other content, stud farm director Tatjana Vošinek Pucer said. Pucer cut the ribbon at the new hall, alongside Slovenian President Nataša Pirc Musar and Economy Ministry State Secretary Matevž Frangež.

"I'm truly very happy that cultural monuments such as Lipica are being renovated," Pirc Musar told the press. "It has true cultural value, and the addition to the UNESCO list was well deserved."

She expressed satisfaction that the UNESCO addition was prompted by eight countries, which means that they will work even more closely in the future. "This is great added value. In the past there was a lot of rivalry, and now they work together."

Pirc Musar also said she was excited about new legislation being drafted for the state-owned stud farm by the Economy Ministry since it will serve as a strategy for cultural heritage management. State Secretary Frangež said the bill would be passed this year.

Secretary Frangež also talked about the investments planned at the farm, saying the riding hall marked the half-way point of an extensive investment cycle that started years ago with renovations to the center of the property, the manor, and most of the stables.

By 2030, when the Lipica Stud Farm will be celebrating its 450th anniversary, the Economy Ministry wants it to be in top condition. This year, the pool and wellness center at the recently renovated Maestoso Hotel will also be updated.

Castle work completed... after a half century

LJUBLJANA (STA) — The lengthy renovation of Ljubljana Castle that spanned more than 50 years is finally complete, and the castle opened its last renovated room - known as the Kazemate, which will serve as a multi-purpose venue – in late January

The Kazemate is the largest room in the castle, measuring 31 meters (approx. 102 feet) in length. In the late Middle Ages the Kazemate served as a passage to the courtyard; later, when the castle became a penitentiary, the Kazemate was a large sleeping area for prisoners. In the early 20th century the room served as a carpentry workshop.

Following the renovation, the room is now set up as a multi-purpose hall, keeping its authenticity while allowing various events to be held there. "We deepened a part of the space and restored it, and we installed a movable floor," said Majda Kregar, one of the architects working on the renovation of the castle, adding that the floor required some innovation. The renovation of the room, which totaled EUR 2.5 million (\$2.72 million), was funded by the Ljubljana

The overarching project, the renovation of the entire castle, began in 1969. Back then the castle was "highly degraded" and in need of "thorough intervention," Kregar said. [The architects] hoped to create a "lively cultural center that would be attractive to the citizens of Ljubljana," she added. The renovation has preserved all elements that testify to the castle's growth over the centuries, including walls, ceilings, arches, and defensive and other openings.

Now the castle "is alive and makes its own survival possible," said Kregar, adding that it appears as if the renovation was completed in one move. The project's architects received an award for their work last year from the city of

While the renovation within the castle's walls is completed, there is still more work to be done, including the renovation of the bastion outside the walls. "And traffic has to be removed from the Castle Hill plateau; underground parking arranged..." said Kregar.

Ljubljana Castle is a venue for many concerts, film screenings, educational events and theatrical performances. In 2023 the castle welcomed 1.19 million visitors, nearly 200,000 more than in 2022. More than 75 percent of all visitors are foreign guests.
