Sunday will offer another full day of activity, starting at 11:30 a.m. with the dedication of the newly-completed fire pit near the lake in memory of the late Kevin Richards. At noon, Joe Valencic from Cleveland will show the DVD "100% Slovenian—Stories of Slovenian Women in America" in the basement Wine Room of the Culkar Building.

The Society mourns the passing of former National Board member Bro. Ken Anderson

IMPERIAL, Pa. — The Slovene National Benefit Society sadly announces the May 2, 2024, passing of former SNPJ Finance Committee member, current District 5 Athletic Board member and SNPJ Lodge 677 President Bro. Kenneth W. "Ken" Anderson, 87. He was

a 63-year SNPJ member.

Bro. Anderson was born Feb. 28, 1937, in Detroit, the son of Paul and Julia Anderson. He was the grandson of August and Marit Anderson, who emigrated from Sweden and Norway in the 1870s to Michigan's Upper Peninsula to find work in the copper mine industry.

Ken attended McKenzie High School in Detroit and Waldorf Lutheran College in Forest City, Iowa, where he majored in business and played on both the baseball and football teams. Growing up, Ken attended St. Olaf's Lutheran Church in Detroit with his parents and family. He enlisted and served in the Michigan National Guard from 1960 to 1962 and was assigned as a mechanic and truck driver at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

Ken's first employment was at a Speedway gas station where he found his love of cars and

met his future bride. His professional career began at the forefront of the computer industry, first working the night shift at Allstate as a mainframe computer operator utilizing punch cards, then at American Standard, and finally at Blue Cross-Blue Shield where he retired as Chief Systems Analyst in 1988.

Ken went on to start several automotive service businesses, working alongside his sons, then sold mortgages in the hot housing market that existed in the late 1990s. During his time at Allstate, Ken became active as a Junior Achievement Advisor, assisting young people learn about business. This was the start of many years of volunteering.

He also coached his son's baseball teams, served as president of Birmingham, Mich., Little League alongside local Red Wing great Gordie Howe and Tiger great Al Kaline, and helped spearhead the renaming of the league for 13- and 14-year-olds from "Babe Ruth" to the new "Al Kaline League." Their team, the Yankees, won the league's inaugural championship.

Ken followed his wife's family, Frank and Helen Bonardi, joining the SNPJ, where he found a lifetime of involvement. He participated in SNPJ baseball, bowling and golf leagues, and

Slovenia elected to the UNICEF Executive Board

NEW YORK (STA) — Slovenia was elected to the Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) for a three-year term starting in January 2025 and running through the end of 2027, Slovenian Ambassador to the UN Boštjan Malovrh announced in mid-April following the UN Economic and Social Council elections.

The Executive Board is the governing body of UNICEF. It oversees the agency's work; approves policy, budget and country programs; and provides country support. The board includes representatives of 36 UN member states, with seats distributed according to the world organization's regional key. The Western Europe and Others group has 12 seats, the Africa group eight, the Asia group seven, Latin America and the Caribbean five, and Eastern Europe four.

The Executive Board meets in New York three times a year, in February, June and September.

The work of the Executive Board is coordinated by the Bureau, comprising the president and four vice presidents, each officer representing one of the five UN regional groups.

Space technology companies visit the U.S.

DENVER (STA) — In mid-April, several companies that have contributed to Slovenia developing a notable space technologies sector in recent years presented themselves in Colorado Springs and Denver as part of a roadshow organized by the Slovenian Space Office, the SPIRIT public agency, the Slovenian Defense Ministry and the Slovenian Embassy in Washington, D.C.

The visit, designed to promote Slovenia's promising space sector that includes more than 40 small and midsized companies developing innovative technologies and materials, was described by the Economy Ministry as "one of the important steps to strengthen future cooperation between Slovenia and the U.S."

The first leg of the roadshow took place in Colorado Springs, where seven Slovenian space industry companies – Dewesoft, Duol, FerroČrtalič, Intectiv, Obeor, Paradigma Technologies and Skylabs – attended the Space Symposium and presented their products.

According to the Economy Ministry, more than 12,000 participants from around the globe, including representatives from governments, space agencies, companies and institutions, attend the event each year, making it an excellent platform for creating contacts and learning about global trends in the space sector.

While in Colorado Springs, the Slovenian delegation, led by Tanja Permozer, the director of the Slovenian Space Office, met with a representative of Axiom Space, the company building the first private space station, which has international cooperation agreements with a number of countries, as well as with NASA.

Permozer also met with representatives of the European Space Agency (ESA) and with officials representing the institutions of its member states. Slovenia is an ESA associate member and is currently seeking full membership.

Strengthening international cooperation with key partners such as the ESA, the U.S., Italy, France, Germany and EU countries is of enormous importance to Slovenia, whose space sector has been developing rapidly since the country became an associate member of the ESA in 2016, the Economy Ministry noted. "Some companies are already successfully cooperating with the U.S., but there are many more opportunities to strengthen cooperation in this field," the ministry added.

Plenty of waste removed from the Ljubljanica

LJUBLJANA (STA) — In late April, divers removed roughly a ton of waste from the Ljubljanica River, which runs through Ljubljana, during their 33rd annual campaign to wrap-up the spring cleanup in the Slovenian capital.

Some 100 divers were involved in the effort in the Ljubljanica, along with fishermen, firefighters and other volunteers who helped onshore. The waste



recovered from the river was displayed at the Cobbler's Bridge.

Since some of the items recovered were likely linked to criminal offenses such as thefts, the event also included police officers, who tried to establish which of the items might be linked to

Miro Potočnik, the head of the Vivera Underwater Activities Association, was happy to note that the amount of waste discovered was declining year after year. "When we first started cleaning up the riverbed 33 years ago, we gathered four tons; this year we ended up with just under a ton."

This year, for the first time, the divers made their way under the Ljubljana central market to remove waste.

The cleanup campaign was accompanied by an entertainment program featuring the Water Man and Urška who, in a famous ballad written by poet France Prešeren, ventured into the depths of the Ljubljanica River.

Center Rog honored by the EU Heritage Hub

LJUBLJANA (STA) — Center Rog, the arts and culture hub launched in October 2023 in the revamped central building of Ljubljana's former Rog bicycle factory, was recently selected as one of 10 European examples of Local Good Practice in the Field of Cultural Heritage for contributing to the green, digital and social transformation of society.

The center – which houses production "labs" (or co-production workshops), studios for artists and collectives, a library, a large area for socializing and exhibitions, restaurants, cafes and shops – was so honored by the European Heritage Hub, an EU-funded pilot project that brings together heritage initiatives across Europe.

Center Rog director Renata Zamida, who explained that Rog was one of 40 entries from 33 cities or regions from around Europe, said the center would continue to strive for positive change and for meeting local challenges. She noted that the Eurocities network, in which Ljubljana also participates, will present the recognized projects in more detail in the coming months.

The recognition was announced during a late April press conference by Ljubljana Mayor Zoran Janković, who said Center Rog's main problem at present was finding enough space for everybody wishing to be active there.

Ajdovščina included on the Phoenicians' Route

AJDOVŠČINA (STA) — As of April 1, the municipality of Ajdovščina in southwest Slovenia is now included in the Council of Europe Phoenicians' Route which reinforces intercultural links created by the Phoenicians throughout the Mediterranean. The connection helps boost the cooperation of various institutions, universities, museums and cultural research centers.

The Phoenicians' Route refers to the major nautical routes used by the Phoenicians since the 12th century BC for trade and cultural communication in the Mediterranean. The goal of the Route is to reinforce the historical links created by ancient civilizations.

"[The Route] promotes Mediterranean culture and strengthens ties among the Mediterranean countries that share the same history. It is based on historical, social and cultural relations that the Phoenicians created along these nautical routes," the Ajdovščina municipality explained on its website.

The consortium of Phoenicians' Route members brings together institutional, territorial and thematic cultural bodies; universities; research centers; schools; non-profit organizations; private individuals and other groups from 15 Euro-Mediterranean countries. The consortium currently has 108 members, including 18 universities and 22 museums.

According to the Ajdovščina municipality, consortium members are committed to cooperating in research and development, improving knowledge, and raising awareness of both history and European culture. They also organize

cultural and educational exchanges for young Europeans, promoting contemporary cultural and artistic programs. At the same time, they strive to promote cultural tourism and sustainable cultural development.

Ajdovščina was included in the Phoenicians' Route due to its long Roman history: from the first post station, mansio Fluvio Frigido, dating from the second century BC; to the late Roman military camp, Castra Ad Fluvium Frigidum; and the third century AD fortress, Ad Pirum, which was part of the Claustre Alpium Iuliarum Roman defense system.

Band debuts prehistoric silver fir instruments

LJUBLJANA (STA) — Musical instruments made from an ancient silver fir trunk discovered last year during a nature restoration project in Triglav National Park were debuted by Bakalina Velika, an experimental world music band, during a recent concert performed in Ljubljana.

Jani Kutin, the band's frontman, was involved in the discovery of several large pieces of wood in a pond near his home in the village of Čadrg in the Tolmin area of western Slovenia. One of the samples has been confirmed by radiocarbon dating to be more than 6,500 years old; the results of two additional samples are sill pending, Kutin explained. At any rate, both samples are more than 2,100 years old.

The ancient logs were discovered during a restoration of man-made ponds that once served as watering holes for cattle, but were also a key habitat for native species of newt and toad.

Kutin said his brother, Samo, another member of the band, suggested turning the wood into musical instruments. To date, local musical masters have made a flute and a lyre from the ancient silver fir. The wood turned out to be not only strong, but flexible enough to provide a nice resonance. "The instruments are great, and we are happy," Jani Kutin said. The Kutins are planning to have more instruments made from the ancient wood: a classical guitar, a violin, and a more professional lyre.

For the April performance, the two silver fir instruments were used during improvisation since the performers have yet to incorporate the instruments into their compositions.

The band Bakalina Velika, which is currently working on a new album, released their most recent album, "Zviezdna srebruo" (Star Silver), in April 2022. "Bakalina" is an archaic term for a large clay bowl.

Medieval Borl Castle reopens after renovation

CIRKULANE (STA) — Borl Castle, a medieval castle perched high on a cliff above the Drava River in the Cirkulane municipality in northeastern Slovenia, reopened to visitors in late April following a EUR 2 million (\$2.13 million) restoration project through which roughly a third of the castle was restored.

The castle's origins date back to the 12th or 13th century. It was nationalized after WWII and restored in 1952. Initially offering a restaurant and then a hotel, both were closed in the early 1980s. The castle was then used occasionally for special events.

The Culture Ministry was responsible for the renovation project, in cooperation with the Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage and the Institute for Nature Conservation. Culture Minister Asta Vrečko said the project was the first step in the restoration of this monument of national importance.

Hosting an exhibition that provides insight into the biodiversity of the area along the Drava, "the castle will welcome visitors on guided tours, mainly on weekends," according to the director of the agency managing the castle.

The castle's renovated Knights' Hall will accommodate concerts, meetings, events and weddings. Various events can also be held in two castle courtyards.

Management of the castle was recently signed over to the Cirkulane municipality. Mayor Antonija Žumbar said the municipality will cover the costs of maintenance and staff, while the government will continue to provide funding for major repairs and investments.



He quickly took on leadership positions within SNPJ Lodge 677 and the Detroit Federation, running youth bowling leagues, chairing tournaments, organizing group outings to Detroit Tigers and Pistons games, and getting others involved. He was the president/founder of the Detroit Athletic League and the originator of Detroit Week at the SNPJ Recreation

At the Society's national level, Ken's service on the SNPJ National Board included a term as Region 5 Director from 1983-1986, and as a member of the National Board Finance Committee from 1999 through 2022, for a total of 28 years. Over that period, he was elected to serve four-year

terms at each SNPJ Quadrennial Convention.

In addition to serving on the National Board, Ken was also elected to the SNPJ National Athletic Board, serving as a District Director from 1975-1979, and again from 1988 until his passing, for a total of 40 years. He chaired a number of SNPJ Eastern and National bowling tournaments, and SNPJ Motor City Open golf tournaments.

Regionally, Ken served as president of the Detroit SNPJ Athletic League since 1985, keeping the Detroit area golf and bowling leagues active for many years, and chairing many Detroit-Flint bowling tournaments and golf matches.

On the local level, Ken served as SNPJ Wolverine Lodge 677 vice president for 11 years, then led the Wolverine than 52 years, since 1971. From 1975-1977 and again from 1985-1986 he served as president of the Detroit Federation of SNPJ Lodges. He was also a founding member and leader of the former SNPJ Northern Home in Warren, Mich.

He represented the Society at Michigan Fraternal Alliance (MFA) annual meetings for a number of years, serving on the MFA board as president and thus chairing the annual meeting during his tenure.

Ken was respected and honored numerous times over the years for his enduring service. He was always there when someone asked and never complained. He loved spending time with his wife and family at the SNPJ Recreation Center in Pennsylvania and at their cottage in northern Michigan. Ken was loved by his family and friends, and

this life surrounded by family and love.

He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Dorothy Anderson (nee Bonardi), whom he married May 28, 1960; by his children, Tracey (the late Tim Tavalire), Stephen (Holly) and Jeffrey (Karin); and by his grandchildren, Erik, Jack, James, Holli Sommerfeld, Aaron (Anne) Tavalire, and Hannah (Andrew Astells) Tavalire.

IMPERIAL. Pa. — SNPI members complete one cabin exceeds \$30.000: have enjoyed the unique and remarkable place that is the SNPJ Recreation Center. Countless memories that have been made there are treasured by thousands. The Recreation Center is now going on 60 years old and thus, wear and tear has taken its toll.

The large upper cabins, situated opposite the lake, are some of the first structures built on the property. A few years ago the renovation of Cabins #1 and #2 were completed. The 12 motel units were also completed. During the offseason of 2023-2024, Cabin #15 was renovated with plans to complete Cabins #3-#7 before the 2024 season.

The cabins will be wrapped in a vapor barrier and vinyl sided. New windows and doors will be installed. On the interior, new flooring will be installed throughout. The bathrooms will have larger showers with new toilets and sinks. The kitchen sink area will be re-designed. A power vent will be installed at the roofline to draw out the heat, and wall air conditioners will be installed for those 90-degree, hot summer days.

There are 24 cabins, which leaves 16 more to do. The budgeted cost to thus, much more in the way of donations is needed. Since this is not a cultural or educational (scholarship) cause, but rather, recreational in nature, contributions are not considered tax deductible.


